TWO DAYS OF LEARNING FOR STAFF

Student may have had two extra days at home, but the teaching staff spent the last two days engaged in deep, and very emotional learning. I am going to share some of the learning with you hear. I will preface this with a warning that the content may be upsetting to read/see/hear. Yet, it is the truth, and is a part of the story of Canada and of education. I invite you to learn along with us.

Yesterday was the Curriculum Implementation Day for the School District. The focus was on Truth and Reconciliation, with an initial acknowledgement of Red Dress Day, with the showing of a powerful video created by the Communications Department of the District. Truth and Reconciliation has been a goal of NLPS for the past 5 years. Within this goal, the District has created the Syeyutsus Reconciliation Framework (https://www.sd68.bc.ca/board/syeyutsus-reconciliation-framework/). Syeyutsus (walking together) is a Hul'q'umi'num expressions for "walking in two worlds", balancing the teachings from the past with contemporary world views. Our learning yesterday was led by Kevin Lamoureux, who is the current education lead for the National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation. The final activity of the day was a sharing circle, where staff were able to speak about both a professional and personal connection or action from this day of learning. It was an amazing day for all of us.

Today is a school-based Professional Day. We continued with the theme of Truth and Reconciliation this morning, focusing specifically on our school's name change. Staff then worked in grade groupings on literacy and numeracy planning and finished the day working on the theme of outdoor education. It was a very good day as well!

RECLAIMING SPACE!

Our school was built somewhat like the letter "H" – four separate classroom wings or pods, and a centre area for the whole school to utilize. Part of this centre space is an atrium. Yesterday, the Grounds crew from the district came and cleaned out the over-grown garden beds, allowing us to reclaim this space for learning! Our plans are to complete the clean up and then plant in the two garden beds that have been uncovered. Ms. Bradley's K/1 class should notice a significant difference in light in their classroom now that the trees and bushes are gone!
